## Carrying the Olympic Flame: Torch Bearers Selected

The 2010 Olympic Torch is on its way to Mount Currie and five lucky Lil'wat members have been selected to carry the torch on behalf of the Four Host First Nation Internal Torch Bearer Selection program. **Payton Dan, Keegan Andrews, Linda Dan, Randall Phillips, and Dillon Sampson** were all selected after submitting applications stating what carrying the torch would mean to them and what they do for their community.

The Flame will reach Mount Currie early morning February 6<sup>th</sup> 2010. There will be a celebration at the new community complex in honor of its arrival. Everyone is welcome to come out and enjoy in the celebration.

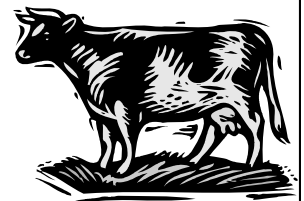
The 2010 Olympic Torch Relay will begin its 106-day Canadian journey on October 30, 2009. The Flame's pan-Canadian journey will culminate on February 12, 2010 when it arrives in Vancouver for the Opening Ceremony before a global viewing audience of billions.

The Vancouver 2010 Olympic Torch Relay route will be the longest domestic Torch Relay in Olympic history, stretching over 45,000 kilometers throughout Canada. Upon its conclusion, the Olympic Flame will have been welcomed in over 1,000 communities and passed within a one-hour of more than 90 per cent of the entire Canadian population.

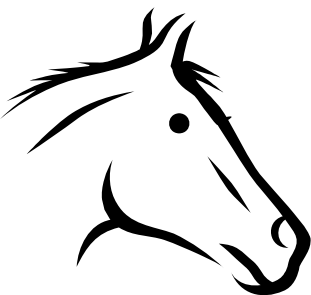
**Jazzmin Pascal** was also chosen to be a torch bearer for the First Nations Snowboard Team by their new sponsors RBC. Congratulations Jazz!



A meeting of the Livestock Owners was held at the Old Hall on Monday evening- Nov 2/09-to discuss what steps we should take to manage our cattle and horses, the pasture itself, and several other issues. The group decided on moving their animals home for the winter. Although it is early, many animals are wandering. Food value is not that great in the pasture grasses since the frost. Owners of Bulls are to get them



in immediately, this week, and the owners of cows and horses are to start rounding up their own animals. Also a request to all stock owners to spend time fixing the pasture fence was made. Arrangements to ship cattle, replacement of breeding bulls, signage on the Lake Road were discussed. A copy of the minutes will go to all Stockmen; some people were not able to attend, but they will receive a copy with the plans that were made. ## 2010 Olympic Planning Update

The 2010 Olympic games are less than 100 days away and although Lil'wat is a little behind in our Olympic Planning we are now well underway. Here is a brief recap of what has been planned and what is going on:

**Media** – during the games there will be 5,000 media stationed in Whistler. At a recent round table involving about 1,500 media the number one topic that outlets from around the world wanted to learn about was First Nations. To address this interest the Band Administration has established a Media Relations Team who are working on gathering photos and video and will be working with the community to identify spokespeople to share Lil'wat stories. The team is preparing a Media Kit which will be made available to news agencies providing overview information about the Nation.

**Events** – Community Celebrations will kick off on February 6<sup>th</sup> with the Torch Relay celebration at the Community Complex. The torch will be run through IR 10, Old Reserve and Xit'olacw starting at 8:30am. A brief blessing of the torch ceremony will take place at the community complex which will be followed by a community breakfast, singing and drumming. We are also planning to use the new community complex as a 'Live Site' during the games. Olympic events will be broadcast daily on the big screen and community members will be welcome to join in with activities, refreshments and cheering!

**Toursim** – In early October, the Look Company was hired by the Mount Currie Band to create a Media and Marketing Strategy for the 2 week period during the games. The proposal that the Look Company put together was presented to Chief and Council and then to the community on two separate occasions. At the centre of the proposal was the construction of an Indoor Soccer Dome which would act as a pavilion for cultural tourism events during the games and a legacy for youth sports in the future. The community identified concerns with the short timelines and costs (both known and unknown) of such a project and on November 4<sup>th</sup> voted against the project in a community vote (218 for, 107 against – 333 total ballots cast). The Look Company are now working with Chief and Council to develop a new proposal and will likely be involved in future Olympic planning for the Band.

**Four Host First Nations and VanOC** – There are many events that will be happening in the coming months that are organized by the FHFN and 2010 Olympic Committee. Band Staff will be attending 2010 Coordinators meetings and getting up to date information about these events. A community calendar is in the works which will outline all events related to the Games and open to Lil'wat members. The first event, organized by Squamish Nation to celebrate the Grizzly Song, is being held on November 12<sup>th</sup> at Totem Hall. Lil'wat will be hosting our own celebration for the song soon after.

There will be a 2010 Working Group meeting held every Wednesday at 10am from now until games time. If you have any ideas about how Lil'wat can celebrate the Olympics please let your Council and band staff know. If you are interested in attending these meetings please let Tanis Grandbois at the Culture Centre know.

## **Pqusnalhcw Child Care Spaces Available**

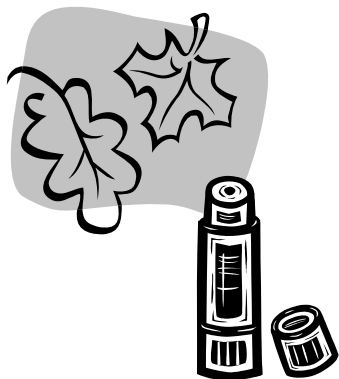

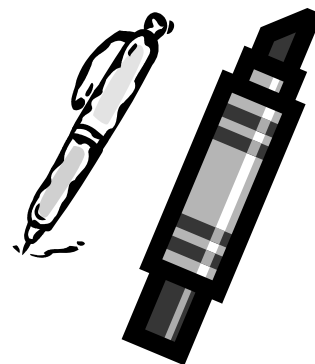
- q Are working and earn a low to moderate income.

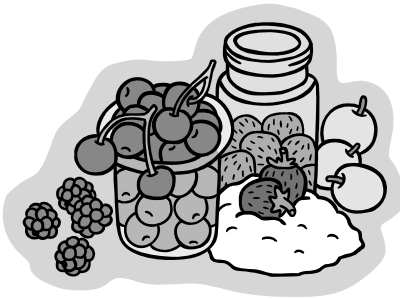

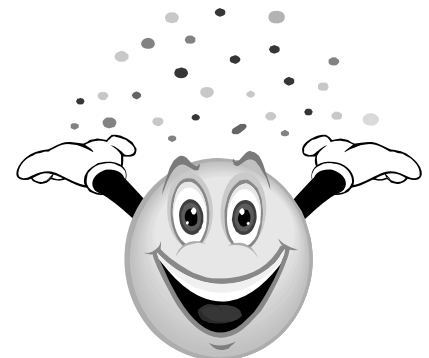

## Ts'zil Update

Our funding policy at Ts'zil, for living allowance, states that if you want to be considered a *full time sponsored student* then you need to apply by the deadline- **June 1, 2009**.

The Ts'zil Learning Centre Board, manager and staff review all applications throughout the summer and go over our policy and select according to the budget and policy.

*We have 76 f/t & p/t students registered, either external or in the community.*

The Ts'zil Funding Policy was created by the Ts'zil Learning Centre Board and was approved by Chief and Council April 2008.

*We are not accepting any applications* for funding all funds are allocated for this year. If you would like to take a course here, you can contact Social Assistance and go over your financial requirements to ensure you are taken care of financially while in school.

We apologize for any misleading information given by any staff, but there are no funds left for this academic year.

The Carpentry Prep Program begins Sept 28, 2009 to Oct. 23, 2009, these four weeks students will be going over Essential Skills, Carpentry Math & English, building picnic benches for Ts'zil, using laser levels, learning basic carpentry skills required prior to the course commencing. Week 5 is the certificate week where we will have the students go through: First Aid Level 1, WHIMIS, Confined Space/ Lock Out, Fall Protection and possibly Fork lift or Traffic Control. If the seats do not fill with the clients (some already have these certificates, we will open it up for the community on EI)

Nov. 2, 2009 is the first day of Carpentry Level 1. This will be 6 weeks in length. All the guys/ ladies, that are taking the program, went through assessment tests to see if they meet the required math/ English levels required by I.T.A (Industry Training Authority). When we complete this level we will then apply to I.T.A an application to run a Carpentry Level 2. This way we can run Level 1 & Level 2 alternating.

The Aboriginal Early Childhood Education program just finished their first term in the Infant Toddler Diploma, and now just begun their practicum. Good luck ladies.

# Overview of Lil'wat Nation Land and Resources Consultation Process

The Land and Resources Department facilitates consultations between the Province and the Lil'wat Nation regarding the use of land and resources within the Lil'wat Territory. This consultation process is a key element in Lil'wat Nation government taking greater control over Lil'wat Territory.

The process we follow goes like this . . .

The Land and Resources Department will receive referral letters from the Province regarding any kind of land use tenure or permit application that lies within the Lil'wat Territory.

Some examples of recent referral letters include:

- rezoning application for the Ravens Crest property to allow for the development of an independent private school,
- upgrading of the trails at Meager Hot Springs,
- wildfire protection work on Whistler Mountain,
- parking lot upgrades at Nairn Falls, and
- a new launching site for paragliders at Mackenzie Basin.

Once we receive these referral letters, we do an internal review within our department. For example, with the Meager Hot Springs referral letter, we had our fisheries department assess the plans for upgrading the trail to ensure it wouldn't impact fish or fish habitat. We also had our Cultural Technician review the referral to make sure cultural sites would not be impacted. Some referrals require field assessments and formal archaeological studies. Once all this information is gathered we bring the referral to Referral Committee.

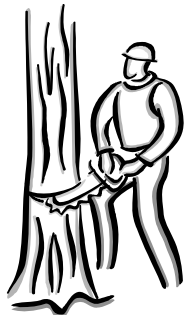
The Referral Committee is made up of five Lil'wat community members. They review the referrals and give recommendations on how to respond. It is their job to ensure all the proper due diligence work is done and that Lil'wat interests are protected. If the activity looks fine and the impacts are low, they will look at ways for the Lil'wat to benefit economically from the activity. This may be through employment opportunities, or payments to the Lil'wat Nation for the land use. They will also determine which referrals should be brought to Chief and Council for a higher level of consultation and accommodation.

We then send out the response to the referral. Our goal is to clearly assert Lil'wat Nation's title to the land, to protect any cultural sites, traditional uses or archaeological sites, to make sure proper environmental impact assessments are done, and to find ways for the Lil'wat Nation and community to benefit from the use of the land.

# Karate Program

## Karate: On the Chopping Block

Karate is a martial art developed in Okinawa, Japan from indigenous fighting methods *te* ("hand") and Chinese *kenpō*. Karate is characterized as a striking art and is practiced for self-perfection, cultural reasons, self-defense and as a sport. Some interpret the "kara" of Karate to mean to purge oneself of selfish and evil thoughts. For only with a clear mind and conscience can the practitioner understand the knowledge which he or she receives.

Karate classes have been offered at Xit'olacw Community School cafeteria and gym every Thursday evening between 6:00 pm and 7:30 pm since January of 2007, by

the Lil'wat Recreation Department. During this time enrolment has drastically fluctuated. There have been as many as 16 people in one class, but the average number of participants karate attracts each week is 2.

Two participants are not enough to keep this program going. If the enrolment does not increase to a minimum of 5 participants by January 2010, we will be forced cancel the program.

Karate is not free, the Lil'wat Recreation Department charges \$25 per participant for five classes (\$5 per class). With this you get one class per week for 5 weeks, a free uniform, and the use of sparring gear. Karate is open to everyone in the community, people who attend are typically between the ages of 7 and 12 years of age. The first class is always free.

The FNMBT was initiated through the Lil'wat Recreation Department and has been operational since the summer of 2008. The program runs from May to September.

This year's team was comprised of 8 local youth: **Miles Andrew, Bryton Nelson, P'sil Bikadi, Trent Smith, Stanley Jim, Eddie Milton, & Gage Gabriel.** The team made 2 trips per week to Whistler or Pemberton for training.

Jack's mother was one of the first speakers, she was very emotional, her son Jack had a heart transplant when he was six weeks old, now is alive and eleven year old boy, he went up to talk to everybody. By all the sniffing we heard, ....we all were happy to see him alive too.

When the medals were presented my nephew Crimson Joseph went up to receive his Dad Michael Van Joseph's medal. My brother Mike (Mack) Joseph gave his eyes, kidneys, and his liver when he died last year Sept 16, 2008.

Other recipients of organs made their speeches about how grateful they were to be alive. Yellow roses and a BC Transplant 2009 Commemorative Video DVD were given away. And we had free parking spot at UBC!

We may still be needing a copy of your 2009/2010 National Child Tax Benefit Notices, even if you filed late please send us a copy.

Earnings need to be declared, we need bank statements, or copies of cheque stubs, we will not be issuing any Social Assistance cheques if earnings are not declared, you can still be supplemented if you do not earn enough.

The consent to release form is our way of tracking your employment and making the appropriate deductions according to your earnings.

Job searches need to be picked up and filled out before booking appointments.

Hydro bills need to be dropped off as soon as you receive them, to prevent late payment charges and/or disconnection notices.

If there are any changes in the household, you need to let us know and we would like you to book an appointment to make the necessary changes.

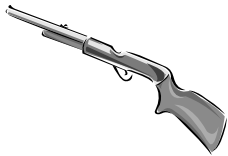
# Lex's Story Corner



## Hunter Jack and the Chilcotins

This is a true story about the time that my grandfather, chief Hunter Jack, made friends with the Chilcotin people. At one time, the Chilcotins were our worst enemies. They came down and took our food supplies, as well as our women and children. During the summer, while the Lillooet men were away, the Lillooet women had to hide, in order to avoid being captured as slaves by the Chilcotins. It was Hunter Jack who helped to improve relations between the Lillooet's and the Chilcotins. One year, during the late fall, Hunter Jack was trapping in the Bridge river area, where he had his trap line. He went up to Gun Lake to cut ice to go trout fishing. When he arrived, he noticed some smoke rising from the south end of the lake. He had seen a large shelter made of boughs in the way that the Chilcotins make their houses. The people had been trapped there by an early snow-fall in the hills. Near the shelter there was a trail, which was well camouflaged by bushes leading into the forest. One of the Chilcotin women saw Hunter Jack approaching and ran into the house to alert the other people. An old man came outside and talked with Hunter Jack while the other people ran away. "Don't be afraid," said Hunter Jack in Chinook; "I want to talk with you; we should be friends." He put his gun into the snow and walked into the house. Inside were a woman and two men sitting on the floor, with a pile of bows and arrows in front of them. After they had spoken, Hunter Jack rested for the night. The old man, who was called Tsa-teich, kept the two young men from killing Hunter Jack. They were very short of supplies and realized that they would need Hunter Jack's help if they were to survive the long winter. Although there was no shelter further along the trail, the women and children had run out into the deep snow which covered the trail. Hunter Jack unloaded his gun and placed it next to the door. Slowly the people returned to the house, they gathered together in one end of the house and listened to Hunter Jack and Tsa-teich talk about how their people had been treating each other. They decided to become friends so that no more blood would be shed. "You don't have to be afraid of me," said Hunter Jack. Then he said to Tsa-teich "I will take two of your young men with me to my cabin and give them what you will need to get through the winter. They will return the next day." When they reached the chief's cabin at Skwi-ta-tal-tiwh, Hunter Jack cooked a meal for the men and gave them a place to sleep. In the morning he packed them some flour, sugar, salt and other supplies which the Chilcotin people would need. Ever since In-kick-tee (Hunter Jack) met Tsa-teich, the Lillooet and Chilcotin people have been friends. When they come to visit us, they are seated first at the table. It was Hunter Jack who helped the people to understand how to behave and get along with their neighbors.

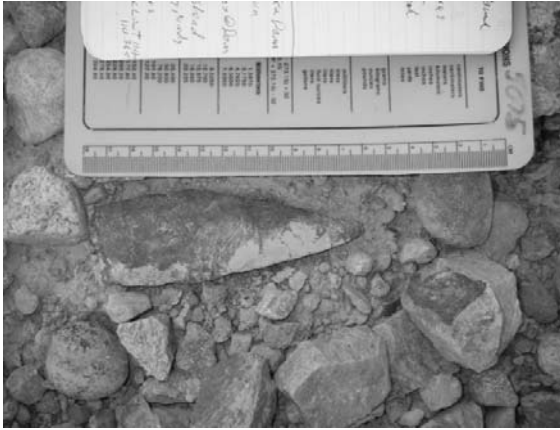


# DAISY LAKE DAM FIELD WORK

# These are Lil'wat stories of the Traditional Territory

To the Lil'wat Nation to let you know where our Traditional Territory boundary is going southward from Lil'wat Nation. Or Mount Currie B.C. There are mountains as land marks because they can't be moved or changed and there is a Mountain called Q'elq'amtensa ti Skenkna'pa-meaning 'Place where the Thunder Rests' in Lil'wat or known today as Black Tusk

The Barrier last came down in 1855 when 3 Lil'wats were in a fall hunting trip in the area. And Back 3000 years ago was when it came down over the Lil'wat Village there. The old timers past on stories to make sure we don't forget them. My dad Jimmy Jones took me there to the spot and told me the story and he also took me to the Transformer rock close by in the Cheakamus River at the pullout just past where the old salt shade was. The Spo'7ez', Rubble slide where the rocks go over the Highway-99 road is the marker; of the End of the Lilwat Traditional Territory boundary my dad pointed it out to me and said never forget this spot. And I said OK. And No body knew about it until I showed them the spot. So as one of the lands worker I GPS it and I noticed a lot of people going to have a look at it. Now is a recorded at the Archaeology. Branch in Victoria B.C.

# Proposed Lil'wat Zoning

Recently the Nation completed a major milestone in adopting a new Land Use Plan to guide future development of Reserve lands. The Land Use Plan is intended to paint a very broad picture of what activities might occur on various sites. Since the plan serves as an overall guide, more detail is required as to how specific properties might be developed. The tool to accomplish this is known as 'zoning'. The zoning tool is designed to specify permitted land uses, to identify how buildings are developed on a property, and for example how large a property needs to be to accommodate certain type of uses. Another way of looking at this is to think in terms of deciding how you might want to travel on a river. Your overall decision to undertake river travel would indicate the need for a boat. Thus a boat is the device that will allow you to travel the river – this is similar to the Land Use Plan, the Plan sets out the very basic idea as to 'where you want to go.' But just deciding to travel by boat is not good enough. Now you need to decide on the type of boat. Will a kayak or canoe be sufficient, or will you need a powered vessel? This is similar to zoning - zoning serves as the more precise tool specifying how you achieve (and the conditions) as to where you want to go.

At this time the Land Management Board has retained a consultant to draft the initial zoning regulations intended to achieve some important objectives:

- The type of land use we want to encourage and discourage in the community
- How many buildings might be permitted on a parcel of land (for example if you have an agricultural property you will often require several buildings to accommodate various agricultural enterprises, for other uses a single building would suffice)
- Making sure that future land uses are compatible with neighbors (for example we do not want to have noisy uses, or land uses that generate substantial traffic right next door to a housing area)
- Ensure environmentally critical areas are protected (this means maintaining adequate clearance from creeks and rivers, and also giving proper consideration to reducing or eliminating the impact of areas subject to flooding)

Another very important issue is how we manage future land uses. Consideration will have to be given to such tools as building permits, or land use permits, and how any infractions might be dealt with. As you can see there is plenty to consider! Finally it must be understood that zoning deal primarily with future development. It will not solve current issues, nor deal with any conflicts that might exist in terms of already established incompatible land uses. Uses that already exist are deemed to be 'grandfathered in', meaning that they may continue to exist provided that any expansion meets the new zoning regulations.

We are now working on draft regulations and zoning maps (which will indicate specific zoning classifications for each parcel of land). There will be plenty of community discussion on the effect and management of zoning once the draft ideas progress.

This means more time for membership and the status cards.

- Status card appointments can be booked through the Band office front desk.
- You may renew your status card before it expires or within the month it is to expire.

**Only in extraordinary circumstances** will a status card be issued when an applicant has no valid ID

Important updates:

✦ A policy directive regarding birth registrations: **Original long form birth** certificates must accompany the birth registrations. Any registrations that do not include the original birth certificate will be returned. Certified true copies or photocopies are no longer accepted.

✦

The new Status Card (Secure Certificate of Indian Status) has been put on hold. Indian and Northern Affairs Canada is not in a position to provide a date as to when the national issuance of the secure Certificate of Indian Status will start.

I've had a few questions regarding people getting their own band number after they turn 18. In 2003 there was a change in policy where that doesn't automatically happen. Anyone turning 18 after June 2003 will keep same band number unless requested to have own unique number ending in 01.

## ACCEPTABLE IDENTIFICATION FOR STATUS CARD ISSUANCE (Certificate of Indian Status – CIS)

#### MOBILE APPLICATION CENTRE DEPLOYMENT AND NATIONAL IMPLEMENTATION ON HOLD

Indian and Northern Affairs Canada is currently addressing technical aspects of the project and until this has been completed, the implementation phase will be on hold. This includes deployment of the Mobile Application Centres as well as production of Secure Certificates of Indian Status.

First Nations members who have applied at a Mobile Application Centre will face delays in receiving their card. INAC has ensured that all personal information collected as a result of their applications is properly safeguarded.

At this time, INAC is not in a position to provide a date as to when the national issuance of the Secure Certificate of Indian Status will start. INAC is taking immediate action to resolve technical issues and will continue to provide updates on progress and as to when processing of applications will resume and card production will begin, through our website.
